Alice Kay (Arneberg) Bingman passed from this life on November 28th, 2015.

They both retired from active duty, with her retirement in March of 1997.

Alice earned her Bachelor's Degree at Cal State San Bernardino which led to a brief stint of teaching in Victorville, CA.

Alice loved to ride horses. Although bowling was never her forte, she loved the sport for the friendships she developed. She tolerated the back of a motorcycle to join friends and see new places. She travelled the world and wanted to travel more. She was a member of the Disabled American Veterans and had a devotion to our Service Veterans both near and far. She joined the "Scrap Happy Quilters" in Okmulgee, Oklahoma to learn new ideas, enjoy like minded friends and improve upon the teachings from her step-mother.

She was recommended for, applied to and was accepted into the "Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks". Alice's military background (and some say her German bloodline) made her mission oriented which startled some when her take charge attitude kicked in to accomplish tasks required to reach set goals. It was said that "If she wanted you to do it tomorrow, she would have told you tomorrow."
