“Marianne was a terrific aunt. She was the daughter of German immigrants who came to the U.S. in 1929. Her nickname was "Babe". She was the youngest of two daughters. Marianne worked hard growing up. She worked in the fields hoeing tobacco, picking tomatoes, pickles, peaches and strawberries, collecting eggs, shelling corn, and swimming in the farm ponds on hot summer days. She and her sister Helene were always together growing up. They were both dark-haired with their skin tanned dark by the sun. People thought they were twins. One day, when they were swimming, Marianne rescued her sister Helene and pulled her back when she swam out where the water was too deep. Both girls grew up working beside their mother and father on the farm. It wasn't an easy life. There were no luxuries. Her parents always kept their German accent and German was often spoken in the home. During World War 2 some neighbors stopped by and forced them to take down the American flag that was flying in their front yard. Those days were challenging for an young immigrant family. But they always had enough to eat and her parents made a good life for their family in southern Indiana. As a nursing student in Indianapolis and later as she worked in hospitals and at the cancer center at MD Anderson, Marianne always had plenty of doctors vying for her attention. But she didn't choose any of them. Instead she married a fair-haired, fair-skinned Air Force pilot from Oklahoma. I remember their wedding day. She married Glenn Doss at St. John's Lutheran Church in Lanesville, Indiana. It was a hot July day and the windows of the church were all open for the breeze to blow through. She looked every bit the radiant young bride in her wedding dress. Marianne was intelligent, witty and had a great sense of humor. She always found something to chuckle about.
